## Singing those old budget blues

Much as The Whistleblower predicted all summer and fall, the county is now in a budget crisis. Small wonder.

After paying off millions to relatives of victims at Drake Hospital, abused kids at the Allen House, legal bills to prosecute and defend Joe DeCourcy, hospital bills for the other Joe DeCourcy, and leases on cars for county officials, the county commissioners finally pumped the well dry.

Commissioners Beckwith. Chabot, and lame-duck

Taft cried "no new taxes" to the congregation of county officials, judges, and assorted hangers on. Beckwith asked for five and ten percent cuts from all county departments. Chabot suggested a

county blue-ribbon Commission, recalling from his days on council how all John Smale and his big-business buddies did for the city was to provide mem-bers of council cover for a tax increase

Unfortunately, savings resulting from recommendations of such a commission—if implemented-would have no effect on next year's budget.

Had Chabot not been brain dead since his appointment to the commission, he would have seen that the light at the end of the tunnel was really a train, and recommended such a commission months ago, when it might have done some

Now they may not need it. Republican prosecutor Art Ney, Sheriff Simon Leis, and Judge Al Mestemaker all stood up to deplore the sad state of the county's criminal justice system.

"We sentence a guy to jail and he laughs at us," Mestemaker said, noting that one defendant in his court that very morning had a rain check for his jail sentence in September 1991.

Both Leis and Ney said they



couldn't follow federal orders without more money.

Will commissioners bite the bullet and raise sales taxes to cover their past indiscretions and current needs?

Only if the other elected officials write and tell us to," said the courageous Sandy Beckwith.

In spite of the commissioners' trying to duck the issue, it's their fellow Republicans making the case for a tax increase.

Democrats, flush with the victory of Dusty Rhodes who is set to be the first Democratic auditor in almost 60 years, are

licking their chops over no less than nine-count

em-county offices currently held by Republicans up in 1992.

Any way you cut it, it will be a "Re-publican " tax increase.

Raising taxe would have an adverse effect on the Chabot county," said.






## Something Special by Roger Chatterly
